A child in elementary school has been asked to participate in the classroom prayer prior to starting in class. The child's parents have protested that this violates her rights.



A teacher at a local high school has recently been put on suspension and is facing job termination for bringing a loaded handgun for school. The teacher says he needs the gun for protection and that he has the right to have the gun.



A man accused of petty theft has his bail set at \$2,000,000 and his passport revoked. The man claims he has rights that protect him from such high demands.



An author has penned a book that is critical of the President of the United States. The book's content alludes to the President's death. The author is then investigated by the Secret Service, but she maintains she has every right to write what she did.



In the wake of the September 11<sup>th</sup> attacks, the police search the homes of known Muslim community members in New York just to make sure things are ok. One family protests that this violates their rights.



A defendant is brought to court on charges of arson. The district attorney has found new evidence that implicates the man. The defendant protests, saying that he has already been found innocent and that his rights have been violated.



A teenager is ordered to face a punishment of 20 lashes from a cane for a campaign of graffiti that he left all around the city. The teen says his rights protect him from this.




A judge found a defendant guilty and handed down a five year sentence for his crime of insider trading after having plenty of evidence presented before her. The defendant insists his rights have been violated.



Prior to a large children's festival, Deputies from the County Sheriff's Office, pick up and detain known sex offenders on the behalf of the greater good. One registered sex offender argues that he did nothing wrong and this custom violates his rights.



Police arrest several members of a crowd of people who gather to protest the United States' involvement in a military conflict. The crowd included several people who burned their draft cards. One of those arrested proclaims that her rights have been stripped from her.



A citizen is charged with violating a statute that restricts owning sexually explicit materials. The citizen claims they have the right to own the materials.



An enraged citizen finds out there is a maximum amount that they can donate financially to a political candidate running for office. This citizen feels their rights have been trampled on.



An individual not suspected of committing a crime refused to give their name to a police officer. Now suspicious, the officer arrests the individual. That person now claims that their rights have been violated.



A suspect unwilling to testify was taken for guilty. The suspect claimed they did not have to testify and potentially incriminate themselves. The suspect said the assumption of guilty was a violation of his rights.
